INSTRUCTIONS TO ALL PERSONS OF JAPANESE ANCESTRY

Living in the Following Area:

All that portions of the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, (hereinafter referred to as the "Area") previously under the jurisdiction of the United States Civil Control Administration, and hereinafter known as the "Area", will be under the jurisdiction of the Western Defense Command and Fourth Army, effective April 1, 1942.

All Japanese persons, both alien and naturalized, will be required to leave the above designated area by 12:00 o'clock noon, Tuesday, April 2, 1942.

No Japanese person will be permitted to enter or leave the above designated area after 12:00 o'clock noon, Thursday, April 2, 1942, without obtaining special permission from the Presidio Marshal at the Civil Control Station located at 1701 Van Ness Avenue, San Francisco, California.

The Civil Control Station is equipped to assist the Japanese population affected by this evacuation in the following manner:

1. Give advice and instructions on the evacuation.
2. Provide certain assistance with respect to the transportation, loading, unloading, and other disposition of personal property including household goods, business and professional equipment, furniture, household goods, books, and records.
3. Provide temporary residence quarters for all Japanese in family groups.
4. Transport, store, and a limited amount of clothing and equipment to those who require it.

The following instructions must be observed:

1. A responsible member of each family, prior to the last day of the evacuation, must submit to the Civil Control Station a list of the property to be evacuated, including household goods, business and professional equipment, furniture, household goods, books, and records.
2. Evacuation must comply with the instructions of the Presidio Marshal at the Civil Control Station.

The Civil Control Station through its agents will provide for the storage of the surplus of the items not accepted for evacuation.

Each family will be required to bring along with it a list of the items to be evacuated, including household goods, business and professional equipment, furniture, household goods, books, and records.

Civilian Exclusion Order No. 5

1. 
