What Are Primary Sources?

Remember, the difference between a primary and secondary source is determined by two things:

- 1. **Source Use:** the way you're using the source
- 2. **Source Authority:** when and by whom the source was created

Definition	Firsthand account created by someone who experienced the event or time period	Secondhand account created by someone who did not experience the event or period
When was it created?	At the time of (or soon after) the event	After the event
What does it use for evidence/examples?	Firsthand knowledge or experience	Interpretation of primary sources
